David Pickering, Associate Professor of Music at Kansas State University, will perform an organ recital on the Bigelow organ Op. 38 (2016, III/43) at First United Methodist Church in Salt Lake City on Sunday, August 5 at 8:00 PM. The church is located at 203 S 200 East, Salt Lake Citv. The performance is free and open to the public; a freewill offering will be taken and Pickering's two most recent recordings will be available for sale for \$5 (LIKE A FIRE--Organ Music of Daniel E. Gawthrop) and \$15 (AMERICAN IMPRESSIONS, recently released on the Raven label). The program will last about an hour and will be comprised of the following works: Chorale Improvisation on "Let All Mortal Flesh Keep Silent" (J.J. Keeler), Prelude and Fugue in D Major, BWV 532 (J.S. Bach), Choral in E

Major (Cesar Franck), and Symphony No. 1--O Jerusalem (Daniel E. Gawthrop)

Membership Overview

Individuals interested in the organ and choral music fields are invited to join the American Guild of Organists. Membership is open to everyone, regardless of denominational affiliation or musical ability.

Membership in the AGO brings the following benefits

- Annual subscription to The American Organist
- Access to national job postings
- Eligibility for high-quality insurance plans for health, car, home, and professional liability at competitive rates
- Discounts on AGO convention fees and educational resources
- Discounts on Certification exam fees
- Chapter events such as recitals, workshops, meetings, and seminars (chapter members only)
- Voting privileges in officer elections

AGO membership is offered both through local chapters, and to individuals who wish to participate as independent members without chapter affiliation. Local chapters hold regular meetings featuring performances, lectures, seminars, and discussions on a wide variety of topics. Many chapters also offer monthly newsletters, scholarship programs, musician placement services, and substitute referrals to employing institutions. Independent members enjoy all of the same national benefits as chapter members, however, they do not receive the various benefits local chapters have to offer.

There is a specific membership available that is only \$50/year. It is for organists who

are volunteer organists, or who make less than \$1000/year from organ work. Don Cook got that going from AGO HQ. There is a paper form for it. It is not online yet.

If you are volunteer church organist and you earn less than \$1000 from your teaching, performance, or service involving the organ, then you qualify to join the AGO as a Volunteer Member.

Volunteer Membership privileges are the same as Regular Members, except that the monthly magazine will be available to you online only.

The AGO is a non-profit organization dedicated to supporting organists in developing their skills and their ability to serve the community. Membership dues provide nearly all of the chapter's income each year. Dues support all of our chapter events and initiatives. For example:

- To support certification and training activities
- To provide social events to make chapter and community connections.
- To sponsor member recitals and concerts that enrich our community and help musicians to discover the wide possibilities for artistic expression found in the organ.
- To give access to the magnificent organs found in Utah.
